HELLO, IT'S ME! (apologies to Todd Rundgren)

I've never been editor of anything much outside of reviewing or drafting project documents for work. PERKIOMEN 2018 – PERSPECTIVES OF A FRESH AMCA RECRUIT

I noted the Perkiomen swap meet & vintage bike show event back in March when I had some time to review the upcoming events for 2018, both ACMA sponsored and others. Being a newly recruited member of the Yankee Chapter, I booked a room on Air B&B for a couple of days in Reading, PA, having guessed the late April weather could be cold, or rainy – or both. There would be other events to arrive on two wheels with!

I left Durham early Thursday morning, and arrived around 11. At first, Google Maps brought me to Jefferson Street, which is where the Vendors and those attedning on bikes checked in, so I got redirected to the attendee parking lot down the road. I did notice a line or two of bikes, mostly mid twentieth century American vee twins. In my conversations with Ted about the club, it was clear it was rooted in Harleys and Indians, but that's only because those two came out on top by the time these machines were made; they "won" on this continent. I soon found out that there was fair representation from many marques across the western hemisphere, with a heavy hint of representatives from the other side of the world. It also became evident that the real focus here is an appreciation of the ingenuity and diversity of these machines, respective of their time and place in our lives and culture, and irrespective where they all come from.

I started exploring the vendors that had arrived; some were still setting up. Motors, frames, forks and all kinds of bits were on display, including whole bikes of all kinds. Diverted by a quick lunch and a stop by the Perkiomen Chapter tee shirt folks, I noticed that the theme of this years events was "Choppers and Bobbers", so I knew I was in for a treat! I grew tired rather quickly of the early 2000's "chopper craze" shows, though I did seek out the few shows about the cafe trend that followed. Modified bikes from the fifties, sixties and seventies is what I grew up with, and while some of those bikes that came from the American Chopper era were touted as "old school", they just weren't the same!

Here's a prime example – a hardtail Indian with an extended springer front end, fishtail pipes and a sissy bar! I love the patina – it looks well worn and ridden – just as it should!



And, here we go again! Keep on Truckin' --- yeah!



I didn't see this bike in the show on Saturday morning, but the fit and finish was pretty period correct, from my limited experience. For the "Chopper and Bobber" theme, it's a great example of the era, lookin' fresh!

The parking lot, now almost full, was getting muddy and slippery, so I put the truck into four wheeled drive and found a spot. It was amazing to see so many more folks at the meet!
