

TOM SWIFT and His Motor-Cycle

The story included in this issue is taken from a boyhood book owned by YANKEE CHATTER'S Editor; and as will be noted dates back a few decades—like six-and-a-half plus! It was always a favorite and is still a cherished childhood memory. I did not get involved with motorcycles until after I emerged with a whole skin from the AUS [Army of the United States—not to be confused with USA (which is United States Army, also known as the Regular Army). Got that? The AUS was composed of drafted civilians taken into service because of the 'emergency'; whereas USA soldiers were enlistees, not conscripts—but, I digress. . . and that is another story.

Tom Swift, in case you didn't already know or suspect it, was the son of an inventor and was himself a youthful inventor. What else? Victor Appleton was writing stories about young hero types which appealed to kids who were born before the advent of radio, "The Green Hornet", "The Shadow", "Jack Armstrong", or "Suspense Theatre"—our big escape from reality was our youthful imaginations amd our books of juvenile heros and their derring-do deeds which sold for as much as 75¢ a copy! We also had Saturday afternoons at the local movie theatre for the next episode of "The Perils of Pauline", "Phantom of the Opera", or best of all a cliff-hanger western starring Tom Mix or William S. Hart (Hopalong Cassidy) when the price of admission was 10¢ (that's ten cents!).

Many of my friends had other books of the Tom Swift series and we swapped and loaned them back and forth. I recall many a night taking my trusty flashlight to bed with me so I could read the latest thriller under the covers when my bedroom light dare not be lit because of parental reprimand; and I'm sure that my friends and I, and others like us, helped keep the EVEREADY Battery Company in business throughout the early years of the Great Depression.


EDWARD A. HIGGINS



He was a good friend and I shall miss him. During his lifetime he was able to do the things that he wanted to do. What more can anyone ask?








HOW to Get There

From NORTH or SOUTH on I-395: [1] Proceed to EXIT 88; take off ramp to Connecticut Route 14A and go WEST on Connecticut Route 14A for 1/2 mile to STOP Sign. [2] Go LEFT (South toward Norwich) on Connecticut Route 12 for 1/2 mile to traffic signal and turn RIGHT on Railroad Avenue (this is still Connecticut Route 14A). Proceed to bottom of hill and turn RIGHT on Windsor Avenue; go approximately 300 yards to V.F.W. Post No. 5446 parking lot.

From <u>WEST</u> on Connecticut Route 14A (Willimantic and Cantebury): Proceed to Plainfield center on Railroad Avenue. Turn LEFT on Windsor Avenue and go approximately 300 yards to V.F.W Post No. 5446 parking lot.

From <u>EAST</u> on Connecticut Route 14A (R.I.State line): Proceed to STOP Sign at Connecticut Route 12; then proceed as in [2] above for NORTH or SOUTH.

This larger-than-life facsimile is from the cover of a boyhood book entitled "TOM SWIFT and His Motor-Cycle". It was written by Victor Appleton and published by Grosset & Dunlop, New York, N. Y. in 1910, long before the appearance of most YANKEE Chapter members:

The following extracts are from pages of the book detailing an experience which Tom had and his amazing solution: He was on an errand for his Father and along the way encountered a tramp on the road. The tramp is talking:

"What's your name, anyhow, cully?"

"Tom Swift," replied our hero, and again he wished he had not told. This time he was sure the tramp started and glanced at him quickly, but perhaps it was only his imagination.

"Tom Swift," repeated the man musingly, and his tones were different from the whining ones in which he had asked for money.

He turned away, and Tom was beginning to breathe more easily when the ragged man, with a quick gesture, reached out and grabbed hold of the motor-cycle. He gave it such a pull that it was nearly torn from Tom's grasp. The lad was so startled at the sudden exhibition of vindictiveness on the part of the tramp that he did not know what to do. Then, before he could recover himself, the tramp darted into the bushes.

"I guess Happy Harry—dat's me—has spoiled your ride t' Albany!" the tramp cried.

Tom wheeled his motor-cycle to a hard sidepath along the old road, and jumped into the saddle. He worked the pedals preparatory to turning on the gasolene and spark to set the motor in motion. As he threw forward the levers, having acquired what he thought was the necessary momentum, he was surprised that no explosion followed. The motor seemed "dead."

"That's queer," he thought, and he began to pedal more rapidly. "It always used to start easily. "Maybe it doesn't like this sandy road."

It was hard work sending the heavy machine along by "leg-power," and once more, when he had acquired what he thought was sufficient speed, Tom turned on the power. But no explosions followed, and in some alarm he jumped to the ground

"Something's wrong," he said aloud. "That tramp must have damaged the machine when he yanked it so." Tom went quickly over the different parts. It did not take him long to discover what the trouble was. One of the wires, leading from the batteries to the motor, which wire served to carry the current of electricity that exploded the mixture of air and gasolene, was missing. It had been broken off close to the battery box and the spark plug.

"That's what Happy Harry did!" exclaimed Tom. "He pulled that wire off when he yanked my machine.

The young inventor looked up and down the lonely road, undecided what to do. To return home meant that he would be delayed in getting to Albany, for he would lose a day. If he pushed on to Pompville he might be able to get a bit of wire there.

Tom decided that was his best plan, and plodded on through the thick sand. It was hard work pushing the heavy machine through the sand, and he was puffing before he had gone very far.

"I certainly am up against it," he murmured. "But if I can get a bit of wire in Pompville I'll be all right. If I ean't——"

Just then Tom saw something which caused him to utter an exclamation of delight.

"That's the very thing!" he cried. "Why didn't I think of it before?"

Leaving his motor-cycle standing against a tree Tom hurried to a fence that separated the road from a field. The fence was a barbed-wire one, and in a moment Tom had found a broken strand.

"Guess no one will care if I take a piece of this," he reasoned. "It will answer until I can get more. I'll have it in place in a jiffy!"

It did not take long to get his pliers from his toolbag and snip off a piece of the wire. Untwisting it he took out the sharp barbs, and then was ready to attach it to the binding posts of the battery box and the spark plug.

"Hold on, though!" he exclaimed as he paused in the work. "It's got to be insulated, or it will vibrate against the metal of the machine and short circuit. I have it! My handkerchief! I s'pose Mrs. Baggert*will kick at tearing up a good one, but I can't help it."

Tom took a spare handkerchief from the bundle in which he had a few belongings carried with the idea of spending the night at an Albany hotel, and he was soon wrapping strips of linen around the wire, tying them with pieces of string.

"There!" he exclaimed at length. "That's insulated good enough, I guess. Now to fasten it on and start."

The young inventor, who was quick with tools, soon had the improvised wire in place. He tested the spark and found that it was almost as good as when the regular copper conductor was in place. Then, having taken a spare bit of the barbed-wire along in case of another emergency,

he jumped on the motor-cycle, pedaled it until sufficient speed was attained, and turned on the power.

"That's the stuff:" he cried as the welcome explosions sounded. "I guess I've fooled Happy Harry! I'll get to Albany pretty nearly on time, anyhow. But that tramp surely had me worried for a while."

He rode into Pompville, and on inquiring in a plumbing shop managed to get a bit of copper wire that answered better than did the galvanized piece from the fence. The readjustment was quickly made, and he was on his way again.


THE O.D. YANKEE WORKSHOP

Cork Display Board By Kevin Meyers

How about a simple project, for around ten dollars, that will greatly enhance the presentation of your MC at the next rally or other static display?

Well, here are all the assembly drawings and materials you will need. An added benefit is that, with a display, the public may get the hint that your pride and joy is something other than a carnival ride for the kids to climb on and destroy.



Cork Display Board

Step 1 Cut the three pieces of 1"x2" (the legs) to five feet long. A clearance hole for the bolt is needed on one end of each of the three pieces of 1"x2". This hole must be one nominal size larger than the bolt used. For example if a 1/4" bolt is used, drill the holes 5/16" in diameter. Drill the holes for the bolt one inch from the top and one inch from the side through the two inch side.

Step 2 The bolt must be three and a half to four inches long to allow the legs (the 1"x2" pieces) to spread. Join the three pieces of 1"x 2" with the bolt. Although, not necessary I recommend using two flat washers, one on each side of the stacked legs. Turn the locknut on flush with the end of the bolt. See Figure 2.

Step 3 Lay the legs on a flat working surface. Spread the outer legs. Now, lay the corkboard on top of the legs. Align the corkboard about three inches from the top and centered. Drill a pilot hole for the sheet rock screws through the top and bottom edges of the corkboard to each of the outer legs. This will keep the wood from splitting. See Figure 3. Screw the corkboard to the legs.


Step 4 Attach the chain to the three legs and paint or whatever. Your display board is now ready for a write up on your vehicle or pictures of your vehicle before restoration or pictures of similar vehicles in use, etc.




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


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
