



Saturday afternoon several groups of people enjoyed a refreshing dip in the lake. Some even went for a repeat swim before returning home.




Joe Moulton's original 1913 EXCELSIOR was a joy to see and hear. It's the same bike his father owned and it's still in the family.




Jessie Jacaruso was a hit with young and old alike. She kept busy providing rides around the track Saturday.

WILLIAM TAUL goes to Panama

In 1912, William Taul, an adventurous 23-year old electrician from Alabama, was accepted to work on the construction of the Panama Canal. When he arrived in Panama, he observed the narrow, unpaved roads, the price of gas, and the tropical weather. He decided to purchase an Indian motorcycle. He soon met Elizabeth Griffin, a dedicated American nurse who was also working for the government. On their days off, they enjoyed many pleasant rides around the canal zone. They sometimes ventured outside of the 10 mile wide zone, although this was not recommended, for reasons of safety. On one such occasion, the jungle road became difficult and unfamiliar. William and Elizabeth rounded a curve and found themselves face to face with a cow, which they could not avoid hitting. The owners of the cow immediately came running, yelling and waving machetes. The frightened couple made a quick get-away.

In 1915, William and Elizabeth Taul, now married, settled in New York City, bringing the Indian with them. One day, William happened to read in a newspaper about a motorcyclist who had ridden from Atlanta, Georgia to Springfield, Massachusetts, setting a record for speed. William was certain that he could make the trip in less time. He set out, on his own, to prove it. He traveled to Georgia, then began riding as fast as he could towards Massachusetts. At one point, he was shot at for using a ferryboat without permission when he couldn't locate the operator quickly. Word of his escapades reached the Indian Motorcycle Company in Springfield. They began planning a reception for him. When he arrived, successfully breaking the record, he was welcomed by a large crowd. The motorcycle company completely refurbished the muddy Indian, free of charge.

William and Elizabeth's first child, a son born in 1916, was taken for rides around New York City. But as the family continued to grow, the Tauls moved to Hartford, Connecticut, and the motorcycle which had served so faithfully had to be sold.

Takes 9th Award in less than 3 years

Sturbridge, Massachusetts June 27, 1992

TRIUMPH DAY!! This two-day annual event at the HAMILTON ROD & GUN CLUB grounds in Sturbridge, Massachusetts is practically unknown to HARLEY-DAVIDSON and INDIAN riders and enthusiasts, but British bike buffs know it well.

Our YANKEE Chapter member, Fred Hirsch, is one of those British bike buffs and his 1947 NEW HUDSON Autocycle with its tiny 98 cc Villiers Junior-de-luxe engine gets him around to several meets each season.

This year TRIUMPH DAY was exceptionally well attended and although the emphasis is on TRIUMPH motorcycles, ALL British makes vie equally in competing for trophies and awards on "Classic Day", the first day of this great event. The NEW HUDSON Autocycle took the "Runner Up" Award in the "Classic Antique" category, being nosed out of first place by a VINCENT "Rapide" of 1000 cc - pretty tough competition for a mere 98 cc machine.

YANKEE Chapter members will recall that Fred's NEW HUDSON took its 8th "win" at our Acton, Maine Chapter meet on June 13-14, 1992; and in 1990 this 'mere 98' took the PEOPLES' Choice Award at the big NATIONAL Annual VINTAGE MOTOR BIKE CLUB meet in Portland, Indiana.

Marty Hansen picked up the ball and finally saw the job through after a lot of calls, visits, and more calls to one of the slowest bureaucracies in government. When the job was finished the plates ended up with the Pope facing the wrong way. Of course we'll be the only ones that notice or care.
