Mecum Auction - 2024Submission From Ken Herschfield

"Vegas, baby! My very understanding wife wanted to go see a certain band in concert at a certain new circular venue on the Las Vegas Strip over the winter. She threw out a couple of dates, so we decided on a weekend, made our arrangements and bought the tickets. A few days later I came home from work and there at my dinner table seat was mail from Mecum announcing their annual Las Vegas motorcycle auction. "Now I know why you wanted to go on that weekend" she said. "I had no idea, but what a coincidence!!!" I replied.

We arrived in Sin City (not Lynn!) late-morning on Friday and headed over to the South Point Casino. Walking in the door we immediately came upon a few motorcycles and signs pointing us to the arena where the auction was held. After a quick bite and "refreshments", we entered the venue and straight ahead was the highlight of the auction - a museumquality 1911 Harley Twin, supposedly one of only four known to exist today. It sure was pretty, but the estimate was \$500K and more than I had budgeted for this weekend.

Motorcycle auctions are kinda weird! Unless you are an expert in a particular machine, you are really taking a chance on buying something without really knowing what is "real" or "correct" or if it even runs! The competition of an auction can make people spend more than they really planned to, as well. With close to 2,000 motorcycles for sale (yes, you read that correctly), there were some deals to be had, and there was some big money thrown around, too. Top sale at the auction was an unrestored 1940 Brough Superior with sidecar that went for \$260K, followed by an immaculate 1928 Indian Ace with Henderson-designed four-cylinder engine that changed hands at \$220K. We walked around the hall, stopped by the AMCA table to chat with club President John Markley, and looked at enough bikes to make your head spin.





When all was said and done, my wife's favorite was a 1996 Gold Limited Edition Honda Z50J – go figure! That 1911 Twin did get bid up to \$200K but did not sell, so if you are in the market for one, it's still out there..."

THE SPAWN OF THE DEVIL

Submission by Maine "Ted" Smith In the US there are very few vintage BMW importers. There were only 443 R17s built. Today there are fewer than 30 remaining. This R17 was imported and sold to me by a well-known aftermarket BMW dealer in Norcross, Georgia. In pictures, the bike looked solid and complete. The dealer had assured me that the bike was completely rebuilt by 'The leading BMW restorer in Germany's Black Forest.









The dealer told me he had personally ridden the bike around his parking lot to be certain it was ready for sale. And, as with almost all vintage bike sales, the bike was sold as-is....

When the bike arrived, I couldn't start the engine because the German 'expert' had incorrectly installed the kick start ratchet. After I rebuilt the transmission, the engine started. Almost immediately after the engine started the right cylinder completely blew apart from its mounting flange.

I'm frequently asked how the bike became known as "The Spawn of the Devil". That's a long story that's best told around a camp fire with a couple of beers in hand. But for now, please take a look at what this bike had to offer.


This particular motorcycle came with a surprise feature: a gas-tank mounted bullet-hole.


Fortunately, the engine's top and bottom case machining numbers match.





This is what happens when the expert in 'The Black Forest' incorrectly sleeves the cylinders.







Note the difference between the correct pistons (right) and the pistons that were in the bike (left).



The pistons that came with the bike had valve pockets hand carved into them with a die grinder. The valve pockets had been cut completely through the top of the piston. The resulting hole was repaired with a mysterious epoxy or aluminum solder.









Both cylinder heads were missing their rocker arm bridges. Notice the bottom fin was broken off.



The refurbished right cylinder head with new rocker arms, a new rocker arm bridge, new pushrods, new pushrod tubes, new valves and new valve guides.





The badly worn rocker arms had stripped adjuster threads on two rockers and the bearing surfaces were corroded on three rockers. I replaced all them.



Here is the incorrect and repair welded R₁₂ camshaft that came with the bike. It was replaced with a correct and freshly reground R₁₇ camshaft.

And see here my reverse-engineered drawing of the new pushrod tubes.


Animated Rides?
